Program Overview

Georgian College's Honours Bachelor of Police Studies degree online program has been created to support officers in pursuit of continued education to support their personal and professional development. This multi-dimensional degree complements, rather than duplicates, existing educational initiatives, offering courses that encourage increasing levels of thinking and analysis, in a format the supports individuals working full time in industry.

Course Delivery Format

Classes are delivered fully online, in 14-week semesters, combining self-directed lectures, group discussions and instructor support. This delivery allows students the flexibility to work full time and study anytime and anywhere.

Application and Admission Process

The program is open to all current and retired police and military police members who have obtained a rank of first-class constable, or completion of QL3 training, or higher. The Honours Bachelor of Police Studies program is also offered full time, through in-class delivery, for those without the required industry experience.

How to Apply

Applicants must complete the part time application form, which should have been included with this information package.

With the Part time Studies Program Application Form, we ask applicants to submit:

- Detailed resume outlining work experience
- Official transcripts from all post-secondary institutions attended (college and/or university)
- Official high school transcript if you did not attend post-secondary and you studied grade 13 English,
 OAC English or English 12U level.
- Proof of successful completion of your first-class constable or QL3 training.

Police Member Eligibility for Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR)

We value the experience and education our students bring into this program and provide advanced standing where possible to acknowledge prior learning. The Ministry of Colleges and Universities (MCU) and the Post-Secondary Education Quality Assessment Board (PEQAB) have requirements outlining how much advanced standing can be provided to college degree students in Ontario. Reminder – the minimum requirement for program entrance and advanced standing requires current employment (or retirement) as a police member at the rank of first-class constable or higher.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. What is the deadline for applications?

The program offers intakes at three times per year, to align with our academic semesters. Following the recommended timelines supports timely PLAR and Exemption processing. Application deadlines are:

- August 1 for a September start
- December 1 for a January start
- April 1 for a May start

2. What documents will I need to submit to apply?

- Proof of successful completion of your first-class constable or QL3 training.
- Detailed resume outlining work experience
- Official transcripts from all post-secondary institutions attended (college and/or university)
- Official high school transcript if you did not attend post-secondary and you studied grade 13 English,
 OAC English or English 12U level.
- Part time Studies Program Application Form

3. Is there a registration application fee?

The cost to apply is \$75 for a one-time part-time registration fee.

4. How many credits will I get for my policing experience?

You may receive up to a maximum of 50% of the program in Prior Learning Assessment credits, which is the equivalent of 20 courses based on your policing experience. You must have obtained a minimum rank of first-class constable or higher. Canadian Armed Forces Military Police applicants must have QL3 training or higher to receive admission and advanced standing. Other situations will be reviewed on an individual basis.

5. How much does it cost for the Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition, and exemption assessment?

A service fee of \$500 will be charged upon receipt of documents for PLAR, in advance of the predetermined block transfer (PLAR) course credit being applied. This fee will cover delivery and evaluation of submitted documents against program requirements.

6. Is it possible that a PLAR challenge might be unsuccessful?

Yes, if there is not sufficient evidence that the learning outcomes have been met, a challenge can be deemed unsuccessful.

7. How do college degrees compare to degrees from a university?

A degree from an Ontario College of Applied Arts and Technology offered under the Minister's consent is reviewed against the same standard as an Honours Bachelor Degree offered by an Ontario University.

^{*}please note that to ensure accuracy, staff outside the Credit Transfer Centre cannot estimate the results for an individual in advance of the full PLAR assessment.

The Ontario Qualifications Framework (OQF) outlines the full range of credentials offered by Ontario postsecondary education institutions and the knowledge and skills expected of graduates.

8. What is the name of the degree received upon completion of the program?

Honours Bachelor of Police Studies degree.

9. How long will this degree take me to complete?

The duration of the program depends on the number of courses you are able to take each semester, and the number of credits received through Prior Learning Assessment and Exemption requests..

10. How much will each course cost?

Typical degree course costs are approximately \$700 per course. This cost may change over time, so please ensure you look at the college website for detailed information.

11. Do I have to attend any in-class session?

No, all courses for the completion of this degree are offered on-line.

12. Will I need any books and how do I purchase them?

You may be required to purchase a textbook, depending on which course you are taking. Textbooks can be purchased on-line through Georgian Stores, www.georgianstores.com.

13. I have already taken a college Police Foundations or Law and Security program, or other degree courses, what type of credit will I get?

Additional exemption credits may be given up to a maximum of 75% of the program, based on individual consideration.

14. How will I know which courses to take?

The program graduation tracking sheet is included in this package and will allow you to track course completion. In addition, all Georgian College students have access to MyPath, to support program/course planning and tracking - https://www.georgiancollege.ca/mypath.

Please note, we are unable to send course offerings each term out to all program students, so students must be proactive in checking the website, or asking for support when needed. Please note each individual is responsible for tracking his or her own unique progress. It is highly recommended that individuals register as early as possible to obtain the classes they require and choose core courses when available as they are not offered each term.
